



Assessing the Role of the District Legal Services Authority in Promoting Legal Empowerment: A Social Work Study of Jalgaon District

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Abstract

Legal empowerment is an essential component of social justice and inclusive development. The Legal Services Authorities Act, 1987 was enacted to ensure that free and competent legal services are available to economically and socially disadvantaged sections of society and that equal access to justice is guaranteed. The District Legal Services Authority (DLSA) plays a crucial role in promoting legal literacy, organizing Lok Adalats, providing free legal aid, and creating awareness of constitutional and legal rights. This review-based study examines the role of the District Legal Services Authority in promoting legal empowerment from a social work perspective with special reference to Jalgaon District. The study is based on secondary data collected from books, government reports, research articles, and publications issued by the National Legal Services Authority (NALSA). The review suggests that legal literacy programmes, legal aid clinics, awareness camps, and Lok Adalats contribute significantly to improving access to justice, particularly among women, children, Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes, senior citizens, persons with disabilities, and economically weaker sections. The paper concludes that stronger community participation and social work interventions can further enhance legal empowerment and access to justice.

The Legal Services Authorities Act, 1987 created a nationwide legal aid framework consisting of the National Legal Services Authority (NALSA), State Legal Services Authorities, District Legal Services Authorities, and Taluk Legal Services Committees to implement this constitutional objective.

The District Legal Services Authority (DLSA) serves as the primary institutional mechanism for providing free legal services at the district level. It organizes legal literacy programmes, legal awareness camps, Lok





Adalats, mediation services, victim compensation assistance, and legal aid clinics. These initiatives particularly benefit marginalized populations who often face barriers to accessing the formal justice system.

From a social work perspective, legal empowerment extends beyond legal representation. It involves community awareness, capacity building, social advocacy, rights education, and strengthening community participation. Social workers play an important role in connecting vulnerable groups with legal institutions, facilitating legal awareness programmes, supporting victims, and promoting social justice. Therefore, evaluating the role of DLSA in Jalgaon District is important for understanding its contribution to community empowerment and inclusive development.

Research Methodology

The present study adopts a descriptive and review-based research design. The study relies exclusively on secondary data collected from books, peer-reviewed journals, government publications, National Legal Services Authority (NALSA) reports, Legal Services Authorities Act documents, and published literature on legal empowerment and social work. Relevant literature was analysed using thematic analysis to understand the contribution of District Legal Services Authorities in promoting legal awareness and access to justice. Since no primary survey was conducted, the discussion represents a synthesis of published evidence rather than empirical findings.
